## president's report

As the bulbs and blossoms bloom, we welcome the longer days and warmer weather. Once again, the past three months have proved to be busy for PHHWV despite the ongoing restrictions and lockdowns regarding COVID.

On 25 June 2021, the 48th Annual General Meeting was held and was the first one to be conducted entirely by Zoom. This proved to be successful, with 30 members attending. Detailed reports from the President, Secretary and Treasurer, together with many stories and photographs of our members and horses over the past year, can be found in the 2021 Annual Report which is now available both on the website and Facebook. I would like to acknowledge Mandy Macartney, who with help from Julia Murray, put together this magnificent report showcasing our organisation.

I would like to welcome our new (or rather returning) Committee Members Mark Dean, Courtney Brockwell and Trish Hartshorn. I would also like to extend my thanks to outgoing Committee Members Julia Murray and Miriam Orwin for their contributions over the past year.

Following the official business, Dr Melanie Quick kindly made herself available to answer a variety of questions posed by members ranging from equine nutrition to laminitis to rugging. We are incredibly grateful to Dr Quick for imparting her wisdom in such an open and engaging manner.

In an effort to increase income following a record loss, a \$5.00 membership fee increase was proposed and a vote conducted at the AGM saw this motion carried. The membership fee is now \$50.00 per year, with renewals falling due in either March or September. Members will receive an email advising that payment is due. There were a few issues with renewing via the website, however this has now been resolved and we thank you for your patience.

In order to continue with our educational activities despite lockdown, we will be hosting Webinars on a quarterly basis. Our first Webinar will be held on Sunday, 4 October 2021 with Trainer Annie Kesterton. Annie has not only generously offered her time, but she has invited members to nominate topics that they would like addressed. We will shortly be releasing a questionnaire for members to provide their input. We have a range of other speakers lined up for future events and again, I welcome any suggestions of topics or speakers to address horse welfare issues.

As most of you are aware, due primarily to the hard work of Rhonda Petschel, PHHWV was the successful recipient of a grant from the Victorian Government. Minister for Agriculture, Mary-Anne Thomas, met with Project Hope Horse Welfare Victoria in Smythesdale on 16 August 2021 to announce a \$55,000 Equine Rehabilitation Grant for education and training programs and to rehabilitate horses. Sadly, Equitana has yet again been cancelled this year and organisers have rescheduled the event for November 2022. We still look forward to being involved and in the meantime, will focus our attention on the numerous other activities we have planned.

On behalf of the Committee, I thank you for your continued support of Project Hope.

Which outlined a plan to visit regions; a grassroots approach to raise our profile, expand our membership and support horses in need around the state. We had a number of areas on the list with local heroes ready to make this happen...

WELL, as volunteers we can only do so much in any one year BUT we have not forgotten this vision...

THEN along comes:

#### "HOPE HORSE WELFARE PROJECT"

On the 16th August our President and members from Smythesdale and Ballarat went to the Woady Yaloak equestrian centre for a very special presentation. The Minister for Agriculture The Hon Mary – Anne Thomas MP and Member for Buninyong Ms Michaela Settle MP announced our success in the Animal Welfare Grants program- equine rehabilitation. We will receive the sum of \$55,500. Only \$49,000 received to current date

To honour this grant we will be:

- Visiting Yarragon and Warrigal in the Shire of Baw Baw and Smythesdale in the Golden Plains Shire to raise the profile of Project Hope by providing;
- An Open Day and educational session;
- A Horse Representatives training day;
- A training day for horses who have experienced trauma;
- Providing rehabilitation to 12 horses through out the year; and
- Developing 3 educational articles to be presented to communities and shared on our website:
  - Recognising a horse in trouble
  - The overweight horse
  - Basic Safety around horses

We have received a lot of media interest with airplay on regional TV and newspapers in both areas reporting on our success. There was a great flurry of excitement when members across the state saw Kathryn our President on the news.... Although the biggest star of all was PH Daisy- how cute is she! Thanks to Long term Carer Claire Kent for presenting PH Daisy to the Minister.

This grant is giving great opportunity for us to advance our purposes by expanding our reach and empowering local communities to address horse welfare.

The success of our application and the events once again show the calibre of our members as we pull

together to make this happen.



Three years ago I fractured my sacrum falling off a horse. Nine months prior I fractured my wrist falling off a horse! At a medical check up I was detailing all my falls to an incredulous doctor who looked at me with amazement (or was it pity) and asked the obvious question about my riding skills (or lack thereof). I reassured him that it was not the case that every time I rode a horse I fell off, though he could be forgiven for thinking so!

It has taken me 60 years to realise that despite boasting to whoever cared to listen about my prowess on a horse, I actually didn't have any riding skills. What I did have was confidence by the bucket load, fearlessness (or foolishness) and very good balance, for in those days I mostly rode bareback. My lack of riding skills was finally brought home to me when I decided to take proper riding lessons at the age of 64. I knew I was in trouble as soon as the instructor mentioned the diagonal. It got really embarrassing when she spoke of the two-beat gait. What!

In my warm up I'd been trotting around with great confidence but now I was reduced to a bouncing, bumbling beginner.





Fortunately Rumpole (the horse) was very long suffering and was not too perturbed by all this confusion happening on his back. No doubt he had a good laugh with his paddock mates later.

Following the rather serious back injury, I totally lost my nerve and it took me ages to summon the resolve to get back on a horse. But I did.

Now I know you're all thinking what a courageous person I am to conquer my fear but I must be honest – Project Hope Mimi (who had only recently gone under saddle) doesn't move during these sessions. We both enjoy the experience 'rester immobile'!

# PHHWVhorse reports

#### **MORWELL**

An on going case with multiple ponies and a T/Bred on a small property where the stallions and mares are running together. We are working with the RSPCA on this long running case where just recently the RSPCA ordered that the elderly T/Bred mare be put down. The owner is being closely monitored.

#### **MERTON**

We had a call from a man asking for help to catch a horse on his property that is almost completely wild, to have her feet trimmed. After a number of phone calls to various people and vets, I think we finally have this sorted. See next page for her story.

#### **INGLEWOOD**

A call from the carer of a woman who is in hospital regarding surrendering the horses that she is no longer able to care for. The horses have been in a yard for a considerable time with feed and water but little handling. We have a home ready for these 2 horses and they will be moved asap.

#### **CLYDE**

We had a call from a woman who has had a Standardbred mare left on her property with no contact from the owner for many months. The horse owner would not respond to phone calls so we advised the property owner to take out a lien on the horse which has now been surrendered to Project Hope and is settling into her new short term care home where a leg injury will be treated and she can learn to trust people again.

#### **BALLIANG**

A report from someone who bought a young horse from a breeder, and was disgusted with the state of the horses up for sale. They were thin and had lice. The RSPCA was involved and a letter from the vet stated that the horses were improving in condition. RSPCA monitoring.

#### **KILMORE CASE 1**

A report from a member who saw a pony with a chain attached to its halter out grazing by the road. A visit the next day showed the pony inside the property happily grazing around the house. Regular drive-by's have not seen the pony out by the road again

#### **KILMORE CASE 2**

A report about an elderly horse with several others that were unrugged in horrible weather on a property beside the Kilmore cemetery. A visit decided there was no cause for concern as the horses were all in quite good condition, the paddock was clean and there were a few trees for shelter.

#### **KYNETON**

A Project Hope member raised concerns about two horses near his property. These have now been surrendered to PH and are in STC with Toni Harris for rehabilitation.

#### **MERTON - UPDATE**

Some time ago, we received a report from a new member about a horse on his cousin's property in Merton which he visited at weekends and holidays.

On one visit he noticed a horse had been placed on the property. He knew nothing about horses but quite liked having her there. He started feeding her and noticed her hooves were really long and in bad condition. He couldn't catch or touch the horse and was concerned she might stumble and break a leg. Attempts were made to see if anyone could help but to no avail.



Fortunately, Vets for Compassion came to the rescue. They are a team of skilled vet darters and vet nurses that are often called upon (at all hours of the day) to tranquillise, assess and treat native animals who may be injured or displaced.


Adam from Wangaratta Vets went out to Merton.

He tranquillised the unhandled mare and attended to her feet – she is a big girl and it took four darts! Whilst on the ground she was assessed by Adam and pronounced to be in very good health.

The owner cares about her but is not in permanent residence at the property and has allowed her to become semi-wild. Whilst this is not an ideal situation for the mare, apart from her feet, she was otherwise in good condition. Well done all concerned.


I am developing an Equine Assisted Learning business, EAL is an innovative form of experiential learning where clients develop new insights and learn new skills via relational experiences with horses.

#### **PHHWV SAFFI**



Just yesterday I was riding her in the arena and there


they were, her fan club, hanging on the arena rails the whole time and 'stalked' us back to the stables.

#### **PHHWV LeRoy**

RIP Project Hope LeRoy

Recently another Project Hope Horse Welfare Victoria horse passed over the rainbow bridge.

LeRoy came into our care with his friend Chrissy through a very disturbing situation. The family had fallen apart through drug use and other issues.

Noelle Vine and I picked LeRoy and Chrissy up and I was surprised LeRoy actually made it to the float he was so emaciated. Chrissy had a severe ulcerated eye which had to be removed. LeRoy needed measured feeding and all the basic goings over – teeth, hooves etc. Both spent about eight months with me in what I describe as intensive care. Both horses had a bit of age but LeRoy was in his mid 30's. LeRoy was Chrissy's eyes and bestie. They had to stay together after being paddock pals for some 15 years.

Then along came Bev Anthony. A beautiful lady who only wanted older horses and was smitten by these two. Sadly Bev passed away but another loving home was found for LeRoy and Chrissy with Carole and Jeremy.

Chrissy passed away after a few years and LeRoy became severely depressed until PH Skye came along and slowly they became buddies. Despite years of neglect Chrissy and LeRoy had three incredible journeys with those that loved them. Carole said 'between us all, we gave LeRoy and Chrissy a great life – they knew what it was to be loved and they gave a lot of love back'.

We believe LeRoy was in his forties when he was PTS (put to sleep) by a kind vet that patted and talked to him through his last breath.

In closing, of all the PHHWV rescues I've had over 17 years, these two were my heart rescue horses. Chrissy and LeRoy are now back together. A sad day for Carole and Jeremy who gave them nothing but kindness. Thank you.

Many have donated in the past and I thank you. All the work we do relies on the generous donations and those than can house and care for these magnificent creatures through their rehab.

# crib biting

Oral stereotypic behaviour is the scientific term for cribbing/windsucking/crib biting\*. There is paleontological evidence suggesting that horses have done this whilst tethered since their domestication 15-30,000 years ago.

'Cribbers' show increased stress sensitivity and decreased behaviour

flexibility – basically they struggle to cope with stress and cribbing has been shown to reduce their stress levels, ie, it is a coping mechanism.

Preventing the behaviour (collars, bars, foul tasting pastes etc) without addressing the underlying cause is of great concern. The horse needs to crib and rather than finding ways to prevent it, try to reduce their desire to do so. References available upon request





#### How can you help your horse?

- 1. Increase the time the horse spends eating, ensure they always have forage in front of them. Always.
- 2. Diets suitable for laminitics or ulcer-prone horses are also suitable for cribbers. This means no cereals and no molasses (this counts out many mixes and cubes unless specified cereal and molasses free).
- 3. Alfalfa (lucerne) and unmolassed sugarbeet (e.g., Speedibeet) are very good at neutralising stomach acid and reducing the horses desire to crib after their feed.
- 4. Antacid supplementation may be beneficial to prevent ulcers.
- 5. Consider selenium or another antioxidant supplementation. But take care as selenium is toxic if given in excess (ideally discuss your horses diet with a nutritionist or your vet).
- 6. Avoid all sugary treats as these increase the desire to crib.

- 7. Provide social contact, neighbouring horses the horse can see and touch, windows, mirrors will all reduce the horses desire to crib.
- 8. Daily turnout. As well as the mental enrichment this provides, the movement decreases the chances of colic significantly. This is true for every horse but particularly cribbers that suffer from gas build up. Tethering and stalling are not suitable for cribbers.
- Mental enrichment, toys, boredom breakers, clicker training, ridden work, liberty work – anything to keep the horses mind active and provide reward-based learning.
- 10. Give the horses something soft to crib on to prevent excessive tooth wear. For example, old carpet, rubber matting over the door, soft rope. It will need replacing regularly – but a horse's teeth cannot be replaced.

Cribbers can live a long and healthy life; they are often wonderfully talented ridden horses with the right rider/owner.
