PHHWV Overview

Who are Project Hope Horse Welfare Victoria?

Project Hope Horse Welfare Victoria Inc (PHHWV) is a non-profit organisation committed to providing hope for Victorian equines through education, rehabilitation and advocacy.

PHHWV Inc. is a registered incorporated non-profit organisation. It is governed by a committee of management as per the Associations Incorporations Reform Act 2012 (Vic).

The Australian Taxation Office has registered PHHWV as a Charitable Institution that is Income Tax Exempt in addition to having Deductible Gift Recipient Status which means all donations over \$2 are tax deductible.

PHHWV is run by volunteers and is self funded through memberships, donations and fundraising activities.

PHHWV Mission & Goals

Throughout Victoria, whenever and wherever possible:

- To assist owners through education, assistance and advice to rehabilitate their own horses
- To provide emergency care, treatment and assistance to horses
- To rescue and rehabilitate any horse found abandoned, sick, injured or mistreated
- To educate the community on the plight of neglected horses
- To contribute to the development of improved government legislation and policy

Origins of Project Hope

PHHWV Inc., originally known as Project Hope Horse Rescue, first began in 1973 when a concerned Val Collingwood of Wallan, Victoria, wrote into RIDER magazine regarding the number of neglected horses in Australia.

She outlined a scheme whereby someone could co-ordinate the rescue and rehabilitation of these unfortunate animals and she suggested the name "Project Hope" in memory of a terribly neglected, supposedly aged, buck-jumper from Queensland. She had taken him home to try to save his life, giving him the name "Hope", although he had very little. He died three weeks later from massive worm infestation at the tender age of three.

People responded to Val's letter, assuming that she was to be co-coordinator and the scheme became loosely organised on a district basis.

Gradually, the organisation grew until it became necessary to use newsletters for communication, to introduce memberships fees to help cover costs, and to draw up a constitution. The group steadily grew from there and with the help of a logo and media coverage became a more familiar name in equine circles within Victoria.

vice-president's report

Autumn heralds the beginning of Project Hope's new financial year. For those members not already aware, our PHHWV financial year starts on 1 March and runs until 28 February. This is why we call out for membership renewals that are due in March and September respectively.

The Committee has been busy focusing on the goals for the coming year. We are excited to be having a presence at the Seymour Alternative Farming Expo, which is being held on the 16th, 17th and 18th April at Kings Park in Seymour. Our Secretary, Rhonda Petschel, is speaking to the Law Institute of Victoria's Animal Welfare Law Committee on 22 April about the need for improved legislation and policy regarding horse welfare. Rhonda and fellow Committee member Noelle Vine are attending a workshop this month being conducted by Animal Welfare Victoria on the proposed national Australian Animal Welfare Standards and Guidelines on Land Transport

of Livestock to ensure they are suitable for horses. We are also investigating the change to legislative powers which has resulted in local Councils no longer enforcing the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act 1986 (POCTA).

It is with great sadness that we announce the loss of PHHWV member Judy Malmgren, and our Committee wishes to acknowledge her generosity in bequeathing her horse float to PHHWV. Her family said it was a priority for her to ensure that PHHWV received the horse float for the use and benefit of the organisation, for which we are most grateful.

We look forward to an eventful and successful year!

GRASSROOTS UPDATE

In keeping with two of the purposes of PHHWV, namely 1) to assist owners through education, assistance and advice to rehabilitate their own horses and; 2) to educate the community on the plight of neglected horses, PHHWV has developed the Grassroots Project.

This involves Project Hope members travelling around Victoria, one region at a time, to run Open Days with all local horse-related people such as riding clubs, along with other stakeholders, to introduce and explain what we are about and how we can help the horse community.

The Open Day is followed up with a Horse Representative Training Day, where participants learn more about horse welfare and how to be an effective Horse Representative for PHHWV.

PHHWV horse reports

YARRA RANGES SHIRE

PHHWV received a call on the 1300 number regarding 3 ponies and 2 thoroughbreds in a paddock of around 2 acres on an agistment property. Whilst the ponies were in good condition, the horses had body scores of around 2. PHHWV Horse Rep attended and advised owner about appropriate feed.

GOLDEN PLAINS SHIRE

PHHWV was contacted following the death of a gentleman who had left a horse on his property. The family did not know what to do about the horse. After checking that the horse's immediate welfare was not compromised and that it had basic needs met, PHHWV Horse Rep. made arrangements for a member to attend the property to inspect the horse. Meanwhile, the family made contact with Racing Victoria who agreed to collect the horse and take it into their Reset Program.

GREATER DANDENONG SHIRE

PHHWV received a call regarding 2 ponies with very long feet. PHHWV Horse Rep. attended the property but was unable to locate ponies. Further call from person who reported, where it was discovered that she had not actually seen the ponies. In the absence of any further information, no further action to be taken.

MITCHELL SHIRE

PHHWV received a call from a new home owner who found 3 horses left on the property following settlement. The property is known to PHHWV, and the RSPCA has also been involved in the past. PHHWV Horse Rep. attended and observed a chestnut mare with slipper feet, puffiness around the eyes and a thick dull coat. The grey was lame with very poor feet. Vet and farrier advice being sought. Ongoing

MACEDON RANGES SHIRE

We received a call regarding a mini that the reporter was helping move to its new agistment. The mini was extremely thin and suffering from Cushings which had gone untreated. RSPCA have previously issued a Compliance notice. Reporter concerned the owner will move the pony again. Monitoring.

MURRINDINDI SHIRE

We received an email report of 2 horses with photos showing long hooves and one horse quite lame. Awaiting further report from Horse Rep. The very lame horse had to be euthanased, while the other horse had its feet trimmed and has been taken into a good new home with a horse trainer, who saw something special there.

CASEY SHIRE

We received an email report of a skinny gelding, possibly T/Bred, 16.2 in a small yard with only the remains of a round bale that has been raked up into a pile and possibly spoiled. Reporter has seen the horse go from nice and healthy to a body score of around 1.5 to 2.

Our Rep. visited and reported that the horse is a T/Bred and while it is skinny and very wormy, it appears to be cared for. The small paddock was clean and there was hay. Owner rang in response to our note left and was happy to take advice about feeding, worming, rugging and dental needs. He had just bought fresh feed and was quite approachable and seemed to want to do the right thing by the horse.

PYRENEES SHIRE

We received a call regarding 2 aged Standardbred horses on a property owned by a family member who is unwell, recently lost their partner and has moved.

Caller wanted to surrender the horses to us but we had to explain that they do not fall within our criteria, so suggested where to advertise them, etc.

We are concerned that these horses are left on their own on a sparsely vegetated 10 acre block. To be monitored closely.

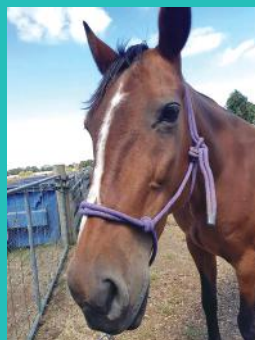
PHHWV JUNIOR

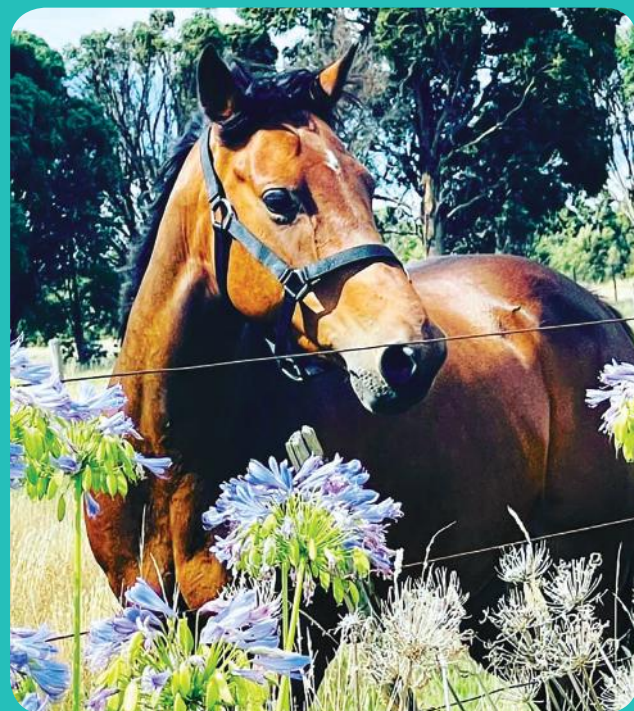
PHHWV TINY

We welcome any members' reflections on their horses, if and when they would like to write a few words or paragraphs, and send a favourite photo.

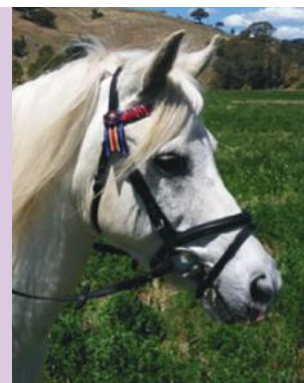
Creature farewelled

Our 'movie star' of the video, PHHWV Creature had to be euthanised on New Year's Day. For the past year he'd been on a high fibre diet, a daily dose of oil, and considerable pain relief -which had kept him comfortable and happy. But in recent weeks it became apparent this was no longer enough; the melanomas were just too large.

He passed away quietly, eating carrots until his final breath. Creature was 25 years old and lucky to have lived such a happy life – thanks to a caring member of the public who reported his horrendous situation to Project Hope.

Dear Creature became the most wonderful therapy horse, lighting up countless lives while visiting people in nursing homes.

Thank you so much to Nicola and John for believing in him all those years ago and for giving him such a loving and caring home.
